Course Description:

This course examines Jewish presence in Latin America from colonial times to the present. The primary focus will be on the literary production of Jewish writers in Spanish America, but will also include selections from Jewish-Brazilian and Jewish-Latino writers as well as a discussion of Jewish themes in non-Jewish Latin American literature. Topics to be discussed include assimilation vs. integration; the formation of Jewish and national identities and anti-Semitism in literature, film, and political discourse. Although the language of instruction is English, students with a good reading knowledge of Spanish and/or Portuguese are welcome to complete the readings in the original.
